Anti-Bullying Code for a safe, calm, orderly and positive learning community

- At Winchmore, bullying will not be tolerated in any way, shape or form
- We are a 'hands -off' school, and respect each other's personal space We are a 'telling and a doing' school, which means that all cases of bullying are shared, followed up and dealt with
- We have a zero tolerance approach to all kinds of harassment for example sexual,

physical and verbal. This includes the use of sexualised, racist and homophobic language which should never be taken lightly as 'banter' or 'just having a laugh'
