Year 12 Trip to the UK Supreme Court



On May 7th, year 12 students studying law visited the UK Supreme Court. During the visit students; participated in a tour of the court rooms and exhibition hall, discussed a sample of cases decided by the Court, and learned of the dual role of the justices in the UK Supreme Court as well as the Judicial Committee of the Privy Council.

Students then observed a 'live' case in which the appellant's barrister was making legal arguments in an appeal relating to non-discriminatory treatment of part-time workers in employment law.

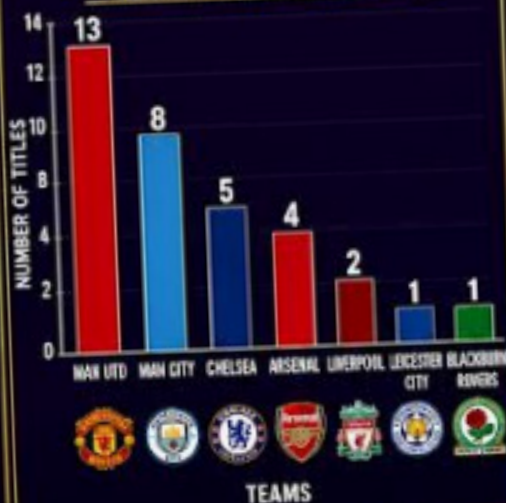

MATHEMATICAL FACTS

SUM (TOTAL)
 $13 + 8 + 5 + 4 + 2 + 1 + 1 = 34$
 There have been 34 Premier League titles in total.

MEAN (AVERAGE)
 $34 \div 7 = 4.86$
 On average, each club has won 4.86 titles.

PERCENTAGE
 $\text{Man Utd: } \frac{13}{34} \times 100 = 38.24\%$
 They have won 38.24% of all Premier League titles.

RATIO (HIGHEST TO LOWEST)
 Man Utd : Leicester City = 13 : 1
 This means Man Utd have won 13 times as many titles as Leicester City.

DIFFERENCE (HIGHEST - LOWEST)
 $13 - 1 = 12$
 The difference between the highest and lowest number is 12.

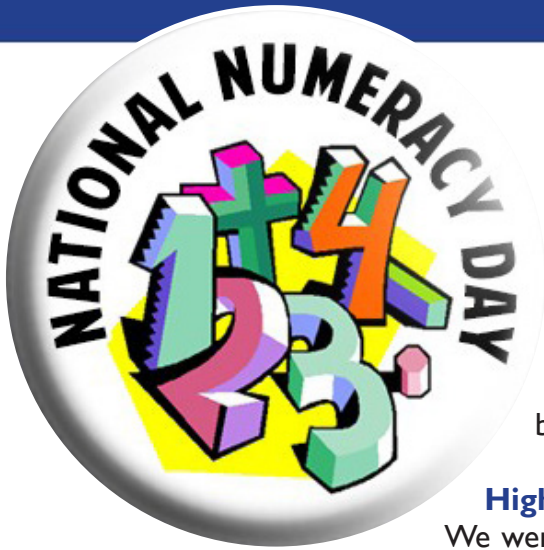

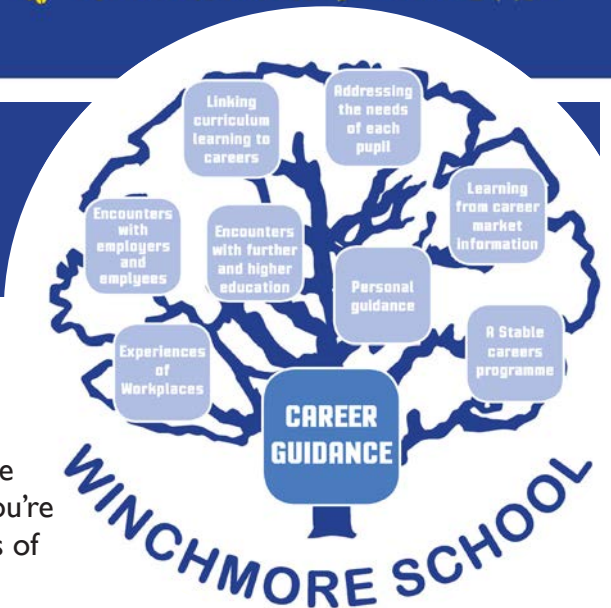

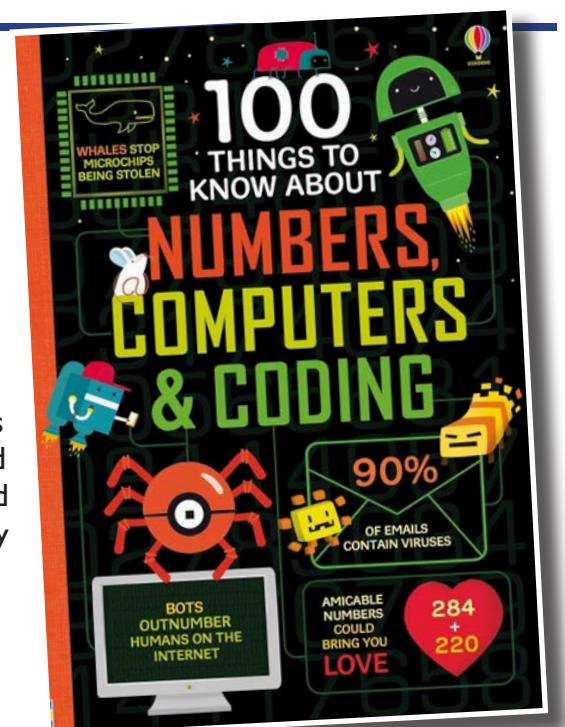
